mega-fandom) in the department where people feel exceptionally well-supported in their professional work, and also appreciated, cared for, and seen.


SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching: Dr. Kathy Doody

THE HERO'S SHIELD": EMPOWERING STUDENTS THROUGH LITERATURE AND ART

Buffalo State Exceptional Education professors, Prof. Judi Harris and Dr. Gliset Morales, local artist Nino Morales, and The Belle Center, a local community organization collaborated on a grant project titled, Literature and Art to "critically intervene in a way that challenges and changes," middle school students. The culminating mural for the project, entitled "The Hero's Shield", powerfully represents how the grant achieved its aims of engaging middle school students in critical dialogue and reflection on social issues through literature and art. Centered on the shield shape [umbrella], the mural intricately weaves together elements from each student's individual artwork, with every component holding symbolic meaning. The young child reading under the chaos of fire depicts the many challenges marginalized communities face today. Echoing themes from the Miles Morales' Spider Man graphic novel, words like "Justice," "Togetherness" "Equality," and "Progress" float around the child, representing the students' focus on societal problems as well as their hopes for change. Imagery of children reading, educators standing firm, and creating art communicate the power of the integration of education and arts to foster community empowerment. At its heart, this piece invites future teachers to see themselves as the heroes who can defend and transform their communities and the young minds in tomorrow's classrooms. This profoundly embodies the project's goal of fostering youth empowerment and civic engagement. The mosaic of students' individual artwork informing a unified mural reflects the collaborative spirit and the connections built through literature, dialogue, and creative expression. By giving life to the collective vision for society, "The Hero's Shield" exemplifies how this grant used arts integration to promote critical consciousness and activation around social justice issues.

EXED Dept. Welcomes Delegation of Education Faculty from Univ. of Zambia

In October 2024, Buffalo State's Exceptional Education Department welcomed faculty members from the University of Zambia's School of Education as part of a continuing initiative to promote awareness of education as a global priority, share effective teaching practices, and build intercultural competencies of current and future educators. During the delegation's visit, the Univ. of Zambia faculty members led several presentations at the Fall 2024 PDS Conference, participated in research roundtables with faculty, visited local schools, and participated in classes on campus. This visit continues a partnership established in May 2023 when a delegation of Buffalo State educators visited Zambia through the International Professional Development Schools (IPDS) program led by Dr. Hashey and Prof. Mary Lavin. In May 2025, Dr. Hashey & Dr. Budin will lead the next IPDS trip to Zambia, where they will continue this collaboration by highlighting and exchanging best practices, advancing equity and access to learning through the sharing of educational resources, and developing a deeper understanding of educational issues and opportunities through visits to local schools. This ongoing partnership highlights Buffalo State's commitment to global engagement and cross-cultural learning in the field of exceptional education.

Keynote Speaker: Dr. Sharon Raimondi


With over 50 years of experience at Buffalo State as both a student and educator, Dr. Sharon Raimondi has been a driving force in the field of special education. She played a pivotal role in drafting the ABA master's program application and has collaborated with Buffalo Public Schools on over seven initiatives to enhance support for students with disabilities.

As Director of the Joint Doctoral Program in Special Education between Buffalo State and the University at Buffalo, Dr. Raimondi has mentored future leaders, guiding 39 doctoral graduates whose impact extends to thousands of educators and students. Her dedication to evidence-based instruction, advocacy, and leadership has earned her numerous accolades, including the 2017 NYS Council for Exceptional Children Lifetime Achievement Award, the highest honor in her field.

With over 60 publications and 200 presentations, Dr. Raimondi's influence spans scholarship, policy, and practice. She remains committed to advancing inclusive education, ensuring students with disabilities receive the quality education they deserve.

FALL 2025 DR. HORACE MANN RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM

The Buffalo State Exceptional Education Department hosted the Fall 2024 Dr. Horace Mann Graduate Research Symposium on December 7th. Dr. Budin. Professor Shaw, and Professor Askew's EXE 690 students proudly shared their Master's projects with their colleagues, fellow teachers and other members in the community.



Buffalo State's Exceptional Education Department hosted a dynamic research symposium featuring presentations on innovative strategies in special education and mathematics instruction.

Dr. Paul Riccomini, a respected expert in mathematics education, shared insights on high-intensity instructional techniques, emphasizing evidence-based strategies rooted in cognitive science and the science of learning. His work focuses on engaging students in conceptual understanding, critical thinking, and problem-solving to improve mathematics instruction across all grade levels.

The symposium also highlighted student-led research on effective interventions, including the CUBES mnemonic strategy for solving math word problems, the impact of self-monitoring checklists on student attention, and the use of technology to enhance active student responses. Presenters explored strategies to support students with disabilities in mathematics and literacy, ensuring equitable access to learning.

The Exceptional Education Department honors the retirement of Dr. Awilda Ramos Zagarrigo (Sisi), a dedicated professor, mentor, and advocate for bilingual special education and TESOL programs at Buffalo State. An alumnus of Buffalo State, Dr. Zagarrigo dedicated over a decade to shaping future educators, leading the Bilingual Special Education Program, and serving as the director of the TESOL program.

Known for her unwavering commitment to students and colleagues, Dr. Zagarrigo was a recipient of the March 2021 Caring Bengal Award and the President's Medal for Excellence in Academic Advisement (2013). She went above and beyond to support students, from providing essential resources to fostering an inclusive and welcoming learning environment. Her efforts extended beyond the classroom through campus leadership, faculty mentorship, and her role as past president of the New York State Association for Bilingual Education.

Colleagues describe her as the heart of the department, always leading with kindness, enthusiasm, and a can-do attitude. Her generosity, whether in organizing student welcome initiatives or uplifting faculty and staff through her leadership in the Sunshine Club, has left a lasting impact on the department's culture.

Dr. Larry Maheady Retires as Horace Mann Endowed Chair in Exceptional Education



The Exceptional Education Department celebrates the retirement of Dr. Larry Maheady, an esteemed educator, researcher, and leader in special education. As Buffalo State's first Horace Mann Endowed Chair in Exceptional Education, Dr. Maheady has made a lasting impact on teacher preparation and evidence-based instructional practices.

A Distinguished Professor recognized by the State University of New York Board of Trustees, Dr. Maheady achieved national and international prominence in his field. Over his career, he has co-authored five books, 110 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters, edited three special journal issues, and conducted more than 300 professional development sessions across 29 states. His research, particularly in peer-mediated interventions and high-leverage teaching practices, has shaped inclusive education and strengthened teacher training programs nationwide.

Beyond Buffalo State, Dr. Maheady's contributions to education extend to his involvement with the Wing Institute and the CEEDAR Center. His excellence in teacher education has been recognized with the Pearson Excellence in Teacher Education Award from the International Council for Exceptional Children. He carried forward Dr. Horace Mann's legacy, advancing teacher education and improving instructional practices for students with disabilities.

We extend our deepest gratitude to Dr. Maheady for his years of dedicated service and wish him the very best in his well-earned retirement!
