I am thrilled to share a brief update to you in my role as the Horace Mann Endowed Chair. You may be wondering: Who is Horace Mann? And what exactly is an endowed chair? Great questions!

Learning about Horace Mann (affectionately known as "Hank") is a mini history lesson about our Exceptional Education Department, of which YOU are an essential part. Dr. Mann joined Buffalo State in 1953 and helped grow our program into one of the largest and most prominent in the United States. He was a passionate advocate for students with disabilities, championing their inclusion in our schools and society. Buffalo State was his home, and we were his family.

Upon his passing, he left a legacy to us in the form of many student scholarships (be sure to check out the CAPS Portal to apply!) and an endowment for the "chair" position. As the current Endowed Chair, I am honored to carry on his mission and will continue to look for ways to support students and faculty to make a lasting impact on the field of special education.

One exciting initiative I am eager to support is the sharing of our teacher candidates' expertise. I want ALL educators to see the amazing work that YOU are doing-- whether it is planning an explicit lesson, developing a behavior intervention plan, or identifying evidence-based strategies to help a student learn to read, solve math problems, or complete a morning routine. Professor Spotlight Mrs. Blask, Continuing Her Passion for Education



This fall, we're shining the spotlight on Mrs. Blask from the Exceptional Education Department. Though she currently holds her master's degree, Mrs. Blask is in the final stages of completing her Ph.D. in Psychology/Behavior Analysis, a remarkable accomplishment that reflects her dedication to lifelong learning and her passion for supporting students and future educators.

Coming from a family of nurses and teachers, Mrs. Blask was inspired early on to make a difference in education, especially by reaching teachers before they enter the classroom. She believes in teaching future educators strategies to help students stay engaged, manage behaviors effectively, and understand the impact of trauma, skills she says older generations of teachers often didn't have access to in their training.

Mrs. Blask's curiosity and love of learning extend far beyond teaching. She admits that if she weren't a professor, she might have become a midwife or even an archaeologist, two careers that reflect her deep interest in people and discovery. That same curiosity is what fuels her passion for research, one of the main reasons she chose to pursue her Ph.D. "I've always loved research," she shared, explaining that earning her doctorate allows her to explore questions she's passionate about and contribute new insights to the field of exceptional education. Her doctoral research focuses on the effects of visual stimuli on active engagement in students with ADHD during math instruction.

Professor Spotlight Mrs. Blask, Continuing Her Passion for Education

At Buffalo State, she teaches courses such as Applied Behavioral Analysis and the project/thesis course, which she describes as her favorite.

"I love watching students start with no idea what they want to do, then seeing their confidence grow as they complete their projects and present at the symposium,"

Her teaching philosophy is grounded in equality and mutual respect:

"Just because I'm your professor doesn't mean I'm better than you, we're all learning together."





When asked what she wants students to take away from her classes, she said, "That they can do it."

Having faced challenges with ADHD herself, Mrs. Blask emphasizes perseverance, relationship-building, and self-belief, values she instills in her students.

Outside the classroom, she enjoys live music, camping, traveling, and spending time with her Boy Scout troop, where she serves as a committee chair. Her guiding motto says it all:

"You have one life to live, make it count, and be remembered for the good things."



PDP Conference

The PDP Consortium holds its conference at the beginning of each fall semester, offering an important platform for professional development stakeholders, including school teachers, administrators, campus faculty, and teacher candidates, to engage in lively discussions on emerging topics in education. Each year, teacher candidates also present their ongoing research through both poster sessions and speaking presentations, sharing their innovative work with the broader educational community.

This year, Buffalo State faculty/students showcased a wide range of projects reflecting global engagement, cultural understanding, and inclusive teaching practices.

Below are a few highlighted presentations from Ex. Ed. faculty and candidates.

The first research group, led by Dr.
Hashey and Dr. Budin, with Darnell
Hilliard, Jasmine Pen, Jourdan
Summers, and Tamiel White, presented
"Zambia Teaching & Cultural
Immersion – Summer 2025." Their work
highlights a study abroad experience
that emphasizes cross-cultural
teaching practices and global
education awareness.

The second research group, led by Dr.
Patti with Alana Jacowitz, explored
"Social Work Observations in
Santiago, Chile Summer 2025." This
project offers a valuable lens into
international social work experiences
and the ways cultural context shapes
community engagement and student
learning.

The third research team, featuring Dr.
McCabe, Kristin Witkowski, and Mandy
Sampson, shared "We Move Together:
Leveraging Disability Studies and
Collaborative Literacy Practices
through Children's Books." Their project
underscored the importance of
inclusive education by integrating
disability studies and literacy
development to foster understanding
and empathy in the classroom.


